








Trends in reporting in Poland- numbers

Reporting by sectors in Poland (2007-2015)





Green Frog Award



- BACKGROUND: Green Frog Award is a DCE award for best sustainability reports given on annual basis. It was launched in 2000 and coordinated by DHU. It spread to other CE countries (Balkans joined 2009, CZ joined 2012, and Baltics joined 2013).
- CONTEXT: beginning from 2017, the EU will require the largest EU companies to disclose non-financial and diversity information.






The Social Progress Index

Measurement framework to support analysis of country performance to aid discussions, insights and investment decisions



Social Progress Index framework

- First Index of its kind no economic indicators, only measures social and environmental outcomes
- 2016 results rank and analyse 133 countries, covering 94% of the worlds population
- Measures country performance across 53 areas to answer three questions:
 - 1. Does a country provide for its people's most essential needs?
 - 2. Are the building blocks in place for people to improve their lives?
 - 3. Is there opportunity for people to improve their position in society?



Country performance scorecards

- Strengths and weakness analysis examines country performance relative to country's economic peer group (15 countries closest in GDP PPP per capita – performance is compared to the median performance of countries within the peer cohort).
- Holistic view of priority areas for action and identification of out-performing areas.
